## How much money can a rare vagrant add to a local economy?:

Scientists had the opportunity to test this very question this past spring as a Black Backed Oriole, normally a Mexican species, made its home in a Pennsylvania backyard for 67 days this previous spring. The hosts of our foreign quest kept a visitor's log book and a group of students from New South Wales did some statistical analyses and computed that \$223, 851 was added to the local and surrounding economy. A combination of local accomodations, food purchases, travel expenses, etc. the single bird generated quite a bonus for Berks County.

Do a Google search for economic impact of birdwatching and you will find tons of studies that support the idea that birdwatchers have and spend money on their passion. Perhaps cold hard cash can change the minds of supporters of extractive industries.


#### Saturday January 20, 2018 Birding Bolsa Chica

Bring water, a lunch, a hat, and sunscreen. We will bird Bolsa Chica and have lunch at nearby Harriett Wieder Park.

Bring your birding stuff, junk food and a lunch. Hope to see you there. Only SERIOUS Rain Cancels. We will leave the Community Center parking lot at 7:00 am. We should be back in Whittier between 2:00 and 3:00.
