# The Race is On! City Nature Challenge 2019

Once again, cities around the world will compete during the 4-day City Nature Challenge, where city dwellers get the opportunity to celebrate nature by recording and sharing their observations of all sorts of life around them. Help Los Angeles County take **the lead**! Last year the San Francisco Bay Area won in all three categories: Most observations: 41,737 Most species found: 3,211 Most participants: 1,532 Los Angeles came in at # 9 for observations with almost 20,000 observations, # 6 for species with a total of 2,356; and # 5 for participants with a total of 855 people making observations.

This year, 162 cities on 6 different continents have joined the challenge, making the competition fierce. We need your help to reach our goals! **How can you help?** 

Become a member of the City Nature Challenge 2019: Los Angeles County project. You don't need to join the project in order to participate, but by becoming a member, you will have easy access to Challenge results and receive tips & updates as we go along.

#### Participate in the Challenge! Between April 26-29

Observation Phase: Get out there and start making observations! Any observation made within Los Angeles County during the above dates will automatically be added to the project. Between April 30- May 5 **Identification Phase:** Make sure you check back in during these dates to help identify observations. There are always more people submitting observations than identifying them and good identification is critical to raising the number of recorded species.

#### MARCH FIELD TRIP REPORT: VENTURA AND PORT HUENEME

Yellow-crowned Night Heron J.Schmahl Larry Schmahl reports:

The March field trip was to the Ventura Harbor area and various locations within Port Hueneme. We started at the Santa Clara Estuary. The estuary is a short walk in the sand from the Surfer's Knoll parking area. The ocean was little rough which may have contributed to the fifty or so Brown pelicans loafing on a small island within the mouth of the river. They were joined by an equal number of gulls, mostly Western, California and Heerman's. Where the river met the waves were six Snowy Plovers. We also had a Black-bellied Plover, Marsh Wren and a few other species.

Our next spot was the Ventura Spreading Ponds. This is a series of freshwater ponds which make up a part of the waste water treatment facility immediately next door. These ponds held a good variety of birds including many species of ducks, egrets and herons including a Yellowcrowned Night Heron. There were numerous Tree, Cliff and Barn Swallows, Blue-gray Gnatcatchers, Marsh Wrens, various sparrows including a Sooty Fox Sparrow and an Osprey.



Our next spot was lunch in Port Hueneme. Thank you to Rebecca Mendez for using her phone to find a park with picnic tables after the park I had planned on stopping at had none. After lunch we birded the end of Arnold Road. The end of this road has shallow freshwater ponds that held hundreds of shorebirds and tens of ducks. The shorebirds consisted of mostly Long-billed Dowitchers, Black-necked Stilts and a few Dunlin. We did not find the Ruff that had spent most of the winter there. We also tried the end of Casper Road. Casper Road is bounded by Strawberry fields and dead ends into a private game reserve. Through the fence were lots of birds on the ponds to which we

had no access. However, the surprise of the day were the Whimbrels in the Strawberry fields. There were at least two hundred Whimbrels we could count and many more that disappeared into the heat waves.

Thank you all for attending. Our field trips are free and open to anyone who would like to come along. See you at the next one in April
