2020 CITY NATURE CHALLENGE

This year marks the 5th anniversary of the City Nature Challenge, an international effort to document nature in cities. From April 24 to 27, 2020, people in over 200 cities around the world will use cameras and smartphones to share observations of wild plants and animals. Each observation contributes to an open database of urban nature that will be used by scientists and naturalists all over the world.

How to Participate

Step 1: Find wildlife - Anywhere in L.A. County

Step 2: Take photos of **WILD** plants & animals.

Step 3: Share Your observations in the iNaturalist App. OR post on social media with #NatureinLA. If they're not wild, be sure to mark them as captive/cultivated!

Step 4: Help identify what everyone found from April 28 to May 3. (see Page 2)

March Field Trips

Beginning Bird Walk, Sycamore Canyon:

Field trip report: Feb 22, 2020

Bolsa Chica

On Feb 22, Linda, Jim, John, and Jeff took a chance and went to Bolsa Chica with the weather predicting rain. It was pretty cold and windy, but the rain held off until the walk back toward the bridge. The tide was very high which kept some birds, like hundreds of Black-bellied Plovers in the back areas, but there were lots

of winter birds. Hundreds of Brant were scattered all over the full tidal area. Eighteen Canada eese were a nice surprise. Lots of shorebirds too, especially Willets and Marbled Godwits. Three Osprey were very active nearby, maybe a courting type activity; there is a nest visible on a power pole just to the south. Lots of ducks were around, large numbers of Ruddy Ducks and American Wigeons. Male and female Red-breasted Mergansers showed, and one Reddish Egret was very photogenic. We walked just a little on the mesa, and said goodbye to Jeff who had parked up on top. And then it did begin to rain lightly, and we headed back along PCH. As we reached the parking lot, the rain had stopped and we wanted to recheck for Ridgeway's Rails & Mountain Plover which we had missed initially. Still no rails, but we got over to the least tern nesting area, and right away I saw the Mountain Plover! He is so cooperative when there, and we had super close looks. We talked to the volunteer who was digging up any vegetation, priming the habitat for Least Terns. We had 51 species, and kept a group ebird list as is recommended, and 'shared' the list. We were all glad we went to Bolsa Chica—Linda Leroy

City Nature Challenge (from Page 1)

Los Angeles has done well recently. Some results from 2019:

The winners in the big three categories were:

- Observations: Cape Town, South Africa with 53,763 observations
- Species: Cape Town, South Africa with 4,588 species
- People: San Francisco, CA, USA with 1,947 observers

LA made the top 10 for each category!

• Observations: 34,125 (9th place)

- Species: 3,249 (4th place)
- People: 1,555 (2nd place)

Altogether, Los Angeles did tremendously well. Some of the highlights include:

- Los Angeles had the greatest increase in number of observations over last year: an increase of 14,702 observations!
- Los Angeles had the greatest increase in number of people observing over last year: an increase of 700 people!
- Over 1/3 of our observers were new to iNaturalist in the two weeks before CNC began!
- This year we need your help to take the top US spot.
