## **2020** Good News from Audubon California

<u>Executive Order: Protect 30%</u> <u>of California's Lands and</u> <u>Waters by 2030</u>

October 7, Governor Newsom issued an executive order with the goal of protecting 30% of California's lands and waters by 2030.

With this decision, California takes the lead as the first state in the United States to make this commitment, joining 38 countries around the world. The governor directed state agencies to develop nature-based climate solutions which will reduce carbon in our atmosphere, protect biodiversity of animals and plants, and protect wildlife habitat.

These goals will benefit all Californians, especially those living in disadvantaged communities who have been deprived of regular availability of fresh water, clear air, and access to nature.

The executive order also ensures that people of color and communities who have been traditionally excluded from the conservation movement will be included, welcomed, and listened to as key stakeholders.

This victory builds on the exceptional leadership of Assemblymember Ash Kalra (D-San Jose), who authored Assembly Bill 3030 (AB3030) this year, and was made possible by the outpouring of support from our Audubon advocates, including the 20,000 letters you sent to support AB3030.

The work to protect California's lands and waters and create equal access for our communities is not done. But we celebrate this historic step. We look forward to working with you, the administration, and the state legislature to advance these goals into statute next year.

### Beginning Bird Walk, San Gabriel River Spreading Basins

Every second Saturday of the month (except July and August,) Oct 10, 2020 7:00am National Audubon is still asking local chapters to refrain from leading field trips or having any gatherings. Therefore we are simply suggesting interesting places to go birding on your own that are appropriate for the season. Our suggested location is the San Gabriel River Spreading Grounds. A great location to park and begin your morning is at the eastern terminus of Mines on the west side of the spreading basin.

### SUGGESTED FIELD TRIP

October Birding
Recommendation: San Jacinto
Wildlife Area Saturday Oct 17,
2020 7:00am

This is, perhaps, the best place to see just about every kind of raptor there is for Southern California. This is the final weekend before hunting season begins.

Rough-legged Hawks, Kestrels, Harriers and Red-tails are everywhere. It seems like there is usually at least one of each duck and a fair bit of peeps. There will be plenty of birds.

We will probably spend our whole time at the San Jacinto wildlife refuge. We will be doing some driving and stopping. The little 22 Channel radios are very handy to have. There are no picnic tables or the like, anywhere in the refuge. There are plenty of places to pull over. I recommend that everybody bring some folding chairs. As long as the weather cooperates, a clear sunny day is about all that is required. A sandwich, Coke and a folding chair are about as close to heaven as one gets in the Inland Empire.

Bring your birding stuff, junk food and a lunch. Folding chairs will bring a touch of civilization.

In addition, this year's October Big Day 2020 is happening during the first <a href="https://globalbirding.org/">https://globalbirding.org/</a> The goal of Global Bird Weekend is to make October 17-18 the biggest ever birding weekend and support BirdLife International's appeal to

end illegal bird trade. One of Global Bird Weekend's aims is to have more than 25,000 people submit eBird checklists on 17 October—will you be one of them?

We recognize that COVID-19 continues to impact our communities. Even if your local conditions have improved, we always encourage everyone to put safety first, follow local health guidelines, and bird mindfully. You can bird from home and still participate in October Big Day!

#### How to participate

**Get an eBird account**: eBird is a worldwide bird checklist program used by millions of birders. It's what allows us to compile everyone's sightings into a single massive October Big Day list—while at the same time collecting the data for scientists to use to better understand birds. Sign up here. It's 100% free.

Watch birds on 17 October. It's that simple! October Big Day runs from midnight to midnight in your local time zone. You don't need to be a bird expert, or go out all day long. You can report birds from anywhere in the world—even 10 minutes in your backyard will help.

Enter what you see and hear on eBird: You can enter your sightings via our website or—even easier—download the free eBird Mobile app. The app allows you to keep and submit lists while you're still out birding, explore nearby Hotspots, and will even track of how far you've walked so you can focus on watching birds. Please submit your eBird checklists before 21 October to be included in our initial results announcement.

Watch the sightings roll in: During the day, keep an eye on how the lists are growing in different parts of the world. Follow along with reports from more than 150 countries. Stats will be updated in real-time on our October Big Day page
