# CONSERVATION UPDATE: Whittier Narrows Dam Modification Project

The Army Corps of Engineers (ACE) is continuing weed eradication and will be hydroseeding in those areas. Current efforts may or may not affect the entire area that is slated for this work. The container plants that were planted are doing well.

#### **TRIP REPORT**

Our Bulmer Memorial Bird Walk took place on a bright, sunny very pleasant SoCal winter morning at Legg Lake in the Whittier Narrows Recreation Area.



In addition to the regular peoplefed regulars, we spotted nearly a dozen Common Gallinules and a

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Short-Billed Gull



(formerly Mew Gull) in the lake immediately adjacent to the parking area. Across the water were Black Crowned Night Herons and a Belted Kingfisher. A Spotted Sandpiper bobbed and weaved among the Coot-ennanny. Drifting over the lawns, we stopped to watch the Red Whiskered Bulbuls along with several feeding flocks containing Yellow-Rumped Warblers, American Robins, Townsend's Warblers, Black Throated Grey Warbler, Ruby



Crowned Kinglets, Orange
Crowned Warblers, a Red
Breasted Sapsucker, Cassins'
Kingbird, Vermillion Flycatchers,
and the obligatory Black
Phoebe. Among the usual duck
species was a Canvasback and a
Red Throated Loon. Blackbirds,
Brown headed Cowbirds, and
Canada Geese rounded out the
usual winter residents.
